MIGRANT SOLIDARITY

Escucha Mi Voz has been organizing rallies outside of the Homeland Security office in Cedar Rapids during immigrant check-ins. ICE has been detaining a number of people during these check-ins, typically after the rallies end and most of the people have left. We will continue to advocate for all of these

families to remain together without fear of abduction and deportation. Most of these folks are Indigenous to Mexico and South America and have ancestral rights to Turtle Island (North America). There are ancient trading, networking and familiar routes spanned both continents that were traversed by Indigenous Peoples.

THERE IS NO DEFENSIBLE STANCE AGAINST GUN REFORM

Great Plains Action Society's Civic Engagement Organizer, Tobias Soudaly-Espinosa, has written an article pulling from their personal experience with the recent school shooting in Minnesota. Tobias's sister is a student at Annunciation Catholic School who was witness to this atrocious act. Tobias recounts the horrible event and conveys the "anger and grief, horrified sympathy, concern, but primarily 'what can we do?' and vengeful expressions of how cowardly the shooter was." In the article Tobias provides under-reported facts such as "98% of all mass shooters are male. Less than 1% are trans." They ask the question "How do we control the use of guns better than the strongest gun safety state in the country? ". They propose ideas such as "Instead of regulating guns like their cars, regulate them like they're drugs." The full article can be found here.

CONVENING OF THE FOUR WINDS AT THE PONCA STOMPING GROUNDS



INDIGENOUS PEOPLES SUMMIT '25

United in solidarity for Sacred Connections: Indigenous Wisdom, Food Sovereignty, and Cultivating Collective Liberation, people gathered at Fontenelle Forest in Omaha. This annual event commemorates the International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples. Hosted by Comunidad Maya Pixan Ixim, this year's summit highlighted the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding regarding the inherent and inalienable rights to self-determination and self-government. Signors included Indigenous and non-Indigenous academics, activists, spiritual leaders, healers, students and other community members. We were honored to attend.

TEACH TRUTH DAY OF ACTION/ NO KINGS DAY

Teach Truth Day of Action event occurred in Iowa City on June 14. By coincidence, the No Kings Day protest happened the same day. A huge crowd showed up for the No Kings Day protest which included speeches by GPAS's Sikowis Nobiss and Marie Krebs. After speakers, chants, and songs, the crowd marched through Iowa City and ended at the Teach Truth Day of Action for more speakers, live music, a banned book exchange and more.

Across the country corporatists policy makers are pushing laws to criminalize teaching honestly about U.S. history and to restrict students' ability to ask questions and engage in critical thinking. Teach Truth aims to expose this dystopian agenda and defend the teaching of people's history.

RIPPLES OF CHANGE - CLEAN UP MIDAM COALITION CONFRONTS BERKSHIRE HATHAWAY SHAREHOLDERS' MEETING

MidAmerican Energy continues to operate five coal burning plants in Iowa (Ottumwa, Louisa, Council Bluffs, and two in Sioux City.) The two coal plants in Sioux City (Siouxland Industrial Sacrifice Zone) border Winnebago and Omaha Tribal land just north and upstream on the Missouri River.

Burning coal makes people sick. It pollutes chemicals such as arsenic and mercury into the environment. Coal ash wastewater entering the Missouri river puts peoples' health at risk.

On May 3rd the Clean Up MidAm Coalition (CUMA), including the Iowa Environmental Coalition, The Sierra Club, The Environmental Law and Policy Center, and Great Plains Action Society converged on the annual Berkshire Hathaway Shareholders' Meeting in Omaha.

At the shareholder meeting, a high school student from Omaha directed a question about the coal plants to Abel. The following is the transcript, and you can watch the exchange <u>here</u>.



REMATRIATION FUTURES SYMPOSIUM

Land Back begins with ReMatriation. Why ReMatriation? Rematriation because mothers are the givers of life, and Grandmother Earth is the giver of life to us all. Rematriation begins with changing the way we perceive land. Colonizers view the land as something to own, to buy, to sell, to transform to ruin for profit. A non or de-colonized mind sees the land and everything on it as our living relatives. Legal rights of nature are coming and are long overdue, and the sovereignty of Indigenous land stewardship is inherent.

On April 11–13 environmental leaders and activists met at lowa State University in Ames, lowa for 3 days of ReMatriation presentations and panels. Subjects included Defending the Land from False Climate Solutions: Fighting CO2 Pipelines and Examining Carbon Offsets; Strategies for Indigenous–Led Stewardship, Cultural Revitalization & Healing Justice; Reclaiming the Power of the Feminine: Exploring the Matriarchy in ReMatriation; Stewarding Land and Food for Community Building, Culture, and Change; Introduction to ReMatriation and Food Futures in Palestine and Puerto Rico; Planetary Round Table: ReMatriation Efforts in Palestine, Puerto Rico & Turtle Island; and an Indigenous Inspired Food Meal by Anthony Warrior.











SIOUXLAND-WINNEBAGO SACRIFICE ZONE CORRIDOR

There is a large sacrifice zone located in the corridor between the Siouxland area and the northeastern tip of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska that is heavily impacted by industrial and agricultural pollution. Heavy industry and fields of corn and soy have been grouped along the Missouri River and are emitting toxins into the land, water and air. This sacrifice zone is affecting large communities of Indigenous Peoples to the south on the Winnebago and Omaha reservations and to the north in the Siouxland area—particularly South Sioux city, which is closest to the sacrifice zone and where significant populations of Indigenous Peoples live (Mayans, Latino/Latinas, and Native Americans).

It's essential to recognize that the Siouxland municipalities (Sioux City, IA, Sargent Bluff, IA, South Sioux City, NE, and Dakota City, IA) and Woodbury county specifically have zoned these areas for these toxic operations and

that they are generally grouped in the southern part of the Siouxland area and in the area between Siouxland and the NE tip of Winnebago tribal land. This is a stark example playing out in real time of the systemic injustices perpetuated by colonial powers that disproportionately affect Indigenous communities with environmental pollution.

To create positive change, it's crucial to unite the communities along the Missouri River, including the Winnebago Tribe, to demand better environmental protections and health resources. Great Plains Action Society has partnered with Fractracker to create an interactive and informative map of the Siouxland-Winnebago Sacrifice Zone Corridor with the internet of uniting the communities in the area and demand better environmental and climate protections.

BEYOND FASHION FEST INDIGENOUS FASHION SHOW





Whereas, the City recognizes the fact that Iowa City is built upon the homelands of Native American Nations to whom we owe our existence, commitment, and dedication and without whom the building of the City would not have been possible; and

Whereas, the area of Iowa City was within the homelands of the Iowa, Meskwaki, and Sauk and because history is complex and time goes far back beyond memory, we also acknowledge the ancient connections of many other Indisenous Peoples bere: and

Whereas, Indigenous Peoples' Day was first proposed in 1977 by a delegation of Native Nations to the United Nations sponsored International Conference on Discrimination against Indigenous Populations in the Americas: and

Whereas, the City of Iowa City recognizes its shared responsibility to honor our nation's indianactic roots birtony, traditions, and outtural contributions.

Whereas, the City strongly supports that Indigenous Peoples' Day shall be an opportunity to

Whereas, the City is dedicated to opposing systemic racism towards Indigenous People, which perpetuates high rates of poverty and income inequality, and exacerbating disproportionate health, education, and social crises; and

Whereas, the City implores our residents to commit to understanding and addressing injustices impacting Indigenous People; and

Whereas, the City strongly encourages educational institutions, businesses, and other organization to recognize Indigenous Peoples' Day and join the City in committing to opposing and overcoming system racism and injustices.



The presentation, which focused the experiences of students of color in the program and lowa's new anti-DEI legislation, drew criticism from UI leadership, ultimately leading Krebs to decide she could no longer continue her education at the university. ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE DATA SYMPOSIUM

Great Plains Action Society Operations Director Dave Whiting attended the inaugural Environmental Justice Data and Mapping Symposium in Houston. Among the many outstanding speakers included Michael Lane (Menominee), the Indigenous Sovereignty Advocate at the Indigenous Environmental Network, and Hazel James-Tohe (Diné), Centered Research & Evaluation – San Juan Collaborative for Health Equity. Michael discussed inherent sovereignty of Indigenous land stewardship. Hazel talked about their work to fight uranium and coal mining. A recurring theme was that environmental justice and social justice go hand in hand. A major takeaway is that the current governmental regime is disbanding EJ Data organizations and deleting data. It is imperative that communities must increase the gathering of EJ data. The symposium was hosted by FracTracker Alliance.
